

FEATURED RECIPE FOR DECEMBER

It's walnut season in Lake County! We thought you would enjoy this simple but delicious Walnut Squares recipe made often by Martha Salter in days past. ENJOY!

WALNUT SQUARES

- Beat well 1 egg.
- Add 1 cup packed brown sugar and beat well again.
- Sift together and add 5 TBS. flour, 1/2 tsp. baking soda, and a pinch of salt.
- Add 1 tsp. vanilla and 1 cup walnut meats.
- Bake in 8x8 pan in 350 degree oven for 15 minutes.
- Let cool, then cut into squares.

FEATURE ARTICLE: BRENNA SULLIVAN



Brenna and Sky

It is my pleasure to feature our own Brenna Sullivan in this month's newsletter. It has been a joy and privilege to have worked with her as co-editor of our quarterly publication. In addition to her co-editor responsibilities, Brenna is our AgVenture contact and Farm Bureau liaison. As concerns her work ethic she is a shining example of the "grace under pressure" phrase made popular by author Ernest Hemingway. You will not hear a negative word or complaint from Brenna even under the most pressing challenges. I am excited to be "passing the pen" as co-editor to Blair Smith beginning 2021, but will miss our partnership in past endeavors over the years.

Brenna was awarded 2020's Star of Lake County for Agriculture. The following is a copy of the letter of recommendation. We continue to be proud of the women like Brenna in our organization who work tirelessly to promote our goals.

"Brenna Sullivan became the Executive Director of the Lake County Farm Bureau in July 2015.

Raised in Lake County on a small farm with a walnut orchard and several horses, she became an expert horsewoman and is currently a board member on the local Horse Council. Brenna also excelled as a competitive swimmer in high school and at UC Santa Cruz, after which she worked as a lifeguard and licensed EMT for the State Park Service in Santa Cruz. It was there that she developed her diplomacy skills patrolling the beaches to keep people safe. In the process, she also saved several lives.

While Brenna did not have a deep background in agriculture when she joined the Farm Bureau, her quick mind and wide assortment of skills enabled her to quickly become knowledgeable and effective. She has built relationships at all levels and has become a tireless advocate for all aspects of Lake County agriculture. During the often contentious, yearlong process of promulgating county regulations for the cannabis industry, Brenna worked hard to understand the positions of all sides and find ways to resolve differences. Her diplomacy and pragmatism earned her widespread respect. She continues to look for ways to unite the new breed of farmers with the traditional ones, which will help us to sustain a viable agriculture industry in Lake County.

Brenna continues to represent the county agricultural community in the discussions on listing the Clear Lake hitch as an endangered species. During this lengthy process, she has worked closely with her Farm Bureau Board to identify the issues and potential impacts surrounding the hitch listing effort and kept growers abreast of requirements and ways to minimize farming disruptions while protecting the spawning areas of the hitch.

When disaster strikes, we can count on Brenna to roll up her sleeves and figure out how to help. In 2018 the Mendocino Complex fire was raging as pear harvest was set to begin. As the situation grew more critical by the day, Brenna collaborated with the incident commanders for Cal Fire, District 5 Supervisor Rob Brown, the CHP and Lake County Sheriff Brian Martin to agree on a plan to allow harvest to safely move forward. During the Valley Fire she helped Sonoma Action for Equine Rescue (SAFER) to find a depot for collecting feed, tack and other supplies for rescued horses and their owners.

An important part of Brenna's work is managing the Irrigated Lands Regulatory Program that helps farmers to meet state requirements for surface water testing. She

represents Lake County agriculture in meetings with the Sacramento Valley Watershed and the Regional Water Board. Brenna has been resourceful in finding cost-effective solutions to the many requirements under this program. For example, she identified an opportunity to partner with Yolo County and join their new on-line system that will be used to input information by all Irrigated Lands members. This system will meet the Sacramento Valley Watershed requirements at a significantly reduced cost. Brenna also successfully advocated for a reduced monitoring agreement for Lake County, which reduced costs while maintaining the effectiveness of our surface water quality monitoring program.

When the Upper Lake and Scotts Valley watersheds were classified as medium priority under the Sustainable Groundwater Management Act (SGMA), Brenna worked tirelessly with the Lake County Department of Water Resources Director and the California Department of Water Resources to present data that showed that these watersheds were misclassified. Due to her efforts, both watersheds were reclassified as low priority, saving them from having to form Groundwater Sustainability Agencies at a cost of millions of dollars and unnecessary regulations that would impact the entire community.

Lake County has a staunch protector and promoter of the

agricultural industry in Brenna Sullivan. She is highly deserving of the Stars of Lake County Award for agriculture."

Postscript from Diane Henderson: Brenna is pursuing an online Masters of Science in Geosciences offered through Ohio University. She says it offers flexible hours designed for working professionals. She is not planning to leave us; she just thinks that this program, which has an emphasis on hydrology, geomorphology and groundwater, will give her more understanding and credibility when dealing with issues like our algae blooms in the lake.

RACHEL ELKINS UPDATE



Although "officially retired," Pomology Farm Advisor Emeritus, and Recall Non-Faculty Academic Appointee (pear and walnut), Rachel continues to work part-time for the University of California Cooperative Extension. Twenty percent of her time goes to supporting the pear industry assisting in the statewide industry and also continuing research trials. She is also utilizing other grant funds to assist walnut growers. We are fortunate to have her continuing in this capacity! Rachel stated "It is important to UCCE that we remain committed to serving local agriculture, as well as maintain our Master Gardener and 4-H programs. Our new Forestry Advisor, Michael Jones, has been working hard on fire hardening programs as well." She can be reached at 707-349-4410.

SUPPORTING LAKE COUNTY'S SCHOOL GARDENS

Our Chapter has actively supported school gardens as well as individual teacher projects that utilize agriculture in their classroom through our Mini-grant program. In 2019, we awarded grants to support school gardens at Kelseyville Elementary, Rivera Elementary, and Cobb Elementary schools plus teacher project grants to 4 teachers.



At our last Board meeting for 2020, \$1,000 was authorized to be used in support of school gardens. We have reached out to the school garden consortium to see if they needed any funds this year, but so far no one has requested funds and none have been awarded. This is due to the disruptions caused by COVID-19. We will continue to explore opportunities to support the gardens and keep the important opportunities for Ag education alive. **~ Terry D. and Annette H.**
